DESERT ISLAND DISCS

Gordon Hay's Desert Island Discs.

Change by Tracey Chapman One of my favourite artists is Tracey Chapman who is both politically and socially active. I could list a number of her songs but I will go for *Change* that explores social inequality through a desire for positive change. She also wrote *Talkin' Bout a Revolution*, which she performed at Nelson Mandela's 70th birthday tribute, and

then there is *Behind the Wall* that is a chilling portrayal of social inequality.

Where is the Love by Black Eyed Peas is another song that reflects on political and social themes. It was written after the anxiety of 9/11 attacks and continues to be relevant for our world today. Apparently, the song had a tempo of 94 BPM that was inspired by the human heartbeat.

We all need a heartbeat and for me the love of God is my heartbeat. Perhaps a bit too cheesy. *O Thou Who Camest From Above* by Charles Wesley was sung at mine, and all previous, Methodist ordination services. This hymn is a daily prayer for me as I ask God to fill me with an inextinguishable love.

An early song that influenced my taste in music was *Wonderwall* by Oasis was another early song that influenced my taste in music. This is a song about the emotion and power of love because 'after all, you're my wonderwall.' The power of this love might mean 'you're gonna be the one that saves me.' HARROGATE SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY AND MISSION

28th September 2024 - 10am at St. Mark's Church, Leeds Road, Harrogate (and on Zoom).

Looking through the Kaleidoscope: Hebrews' Use of Old Testament Narratives in the Light of Jesus' Ascension and Awaited Return. Dr David Moffitt, Reader in New Testament Studies at St. Andrew's University

Hebrews' engagement with the Old Testament is among the most exciting and creative in the New Testament, creating a kaleidoscope of Biblical texts to draw out the author's fundamental convictions about Jesus. We will explore three Old Testament figures mentioned in Hebrews—the high priest, Moses, and Joshua - all of whom left God's people to do important work for them, before returning. They show what the ascended Christ is doing for us now and how we should understand our own identity and situation as we await his return.

Dr David Moffitt's research interests orbit around the various ways the earliest Christians understood Jesus and their own identities in relation to Jewish scripture, practices, and beliefs. David was originally recommended by the eminent theologian Tom Wright, who offered us these words: 'David Moffitt is one of the very few contemporary scholars to provide fresh and compelling readings of the enigmatic Letter to the Hebrews. I have learned an enormous amount from him; in fact, I credit him with transforming my whole understanding of sacrifice in biblical thought. Also, unlike some top exegetical scholars, he is a lively and engaging speaker!'

KILLINGHALL IN THE NEWS

Our friends at Killinghall have made it onto the Methodist Church website with the headlines: *'Making new with old, Killinghall Methodist Church's journey to become carbon neutral.'* This is what the article has to say:

'Located in a growing Yorkshire village, Killinghall Methodist Church has a small but mighty congregation that have worked hard to modernise its building and decrease carbon emissions.

At first glance, the small chapel appears to be a charming rural church like many others. Its dark grey stones give it a timeless look whilst the large white windows make Killinghall Methodist Church, near Harrogate, warm and welcoming.

Walking around, a different story is told by the south side of the building with the roof covered by photovoltaic panels, a heat pump has been installed, a bike rack encourages cyclists to stop while the electric car charging station is a statement to Killinghall's commitment to achieving net zero. As a rural church, Killinghall recognises the need to attract more than just its congregation to utilize its premises. Following extensive refurbishment, the church is now ready to become the heart of the village, offering a range of facilities for the community. One of its features, the electric car charging station, is not commonly found at a church.'

The article goes on to explain a little about the history of the church, and notes that as a result of many people, especially young families starting to move into the area, Killinghall is on the verge of becoming a suburban church.

It goes on to explain that the solid stone, 18inch thick walls cannot be insulated, so the roof was insulated instead and 35 PV panels were installed. The electricity generated is used for the church, stored in three batteries with the extra power sold.

The article also mentions Resurrected Bites and the well-equipped new commercial kitchen. It says that 'By hosting the cafe, Killinghall participates in a project fighting food poverty, loneliness and food wastage, whilst becoming the place to go for delicious lunches on Thursdays.'

PARIS 2024 PARALYMPIC GAMES 28 AUGUST—8 SEPTEMBER 2024.

The Paris 2024 Paralympic Games will feature as many as 4,400 athletes from around the world. They will compete in 22 sports across various iconic venues in Paris, including at the Eiffel Tower, the Chateau de Versailles and the Grand Palais.

For the first time, the Paralympic Opening Ceremony was held outside of a stadium. Athletes paraded through the iconic Avenue des Champs-Élysées to Place de la Concorde and as many as 65,000 spectators witnessed this historic moment, which highlighted the host city's commitment to accessibility and inclusivity.

'The medals for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games feature a piece of original iron from the Eiffel Tower. Designed to be distinguished by touch, they include engravings and braille. The medals were created in collaboration with the French jeweller Chaumet, linking sport with French cultural heritage.'

'The Paralympic Phryge, inspired by the Phrygian cap, symbolises liberty and freedom. The mascot has a running blade and represents athletes with disabilities. The mascot promotes the inclusivity values of the Paralympic Games and the importance of sports.'

'The Paris 2024 Paralympic Torch, designed by Mathieu Lehanneur, represents equality, water and peacefulness. It has the same design for both the Paralympic and Olympic Games, emphasizing a unified vision.'

'The Paris 2024 Paralympics will make history as the first summer Games in France and have already led to positive changes in the host country. For example, overground transportation in Paris have become more accessible.'

HARVEST FESTIVALS AROUND THE WORLD

The Harvest Festival is a long-standing tradition which has existed across many different cultures for hundreds, and in some cases thousands of years. The harvest season falls at different times of the year depending upon region, climate, and crop, but festivals celebrating its arrival are held the world over. Some are first-fruits festivals that recognize the start of the season and the first crops, while other harvest festivals are celebrations to give thanks for the blessing of a bountiful harvest and to mark or ensure the recurrence of the process.

In some parts of the world, harvest festivals have become largely secularized into a more-general holiday. For example, the autumn festival of Thanksgiving, which is observed in Canada (second Monday in October) and in the United States (fourth Thursday in November), is largely a national day of rest.

Rice Harvest Festival (May 1–June 30) The Rice Harvest Festival that is held in Bali, Indonesia, is a feature of the island’s Hindu culture. The harvest festival is dedicated to the rice goddess and is a time of joyous celebration. Effigies of the goddess are placed in the fields in thanks, towns are decorated with coloured flags, and special bull races, among other festivities, are held.

Mid-Autumn Festival (September–October) One of the most-important traditional holidays in China, Taiwan, and Vietnam is the celebration of the harvest. It is also known as the Moon Festival because it coincides with the full moon on the 15th day of the eighth lunar month; special delicacies called “mooncakes” are prepared during this time. Ceremonies are held both to give thanks for the harvest and to encourage the harvest-giving light to return again in the coming year. It is a time of family gatherings, matchmaking, and public celebrations.

Yam Festival (August or September) The Ewe people of Ghana celebrate the end of the rainy season and the first appearance of yams, a staple crop. The duration and exact days of the celebration vary according to place, but, regardless of the manifestation, the festival is held in hopes of averting famine in the coming year. Huge feasts and activities such as dances and parades are held. Similar festivals are held in Papua New Guinea and Nigeria.
