Dear Friends


SENIOR STEWARD'S LETTER

BOOK CLUB REVIEW

The Language of Kindness by Christie Wilson

Earlier this year the Wesley Book Club met to discuss 'The Citadel' a novel by A.J. Cronin about the life of a pre-NHS doctor.

As a complete contrast, in October we read 'The Language of Kindness' by Christie Wilson. This is a non-fiction, real-life memoir about what is like for a nurse working in the NHS today. It is a harrowing read (it may well make you cry as it deals with many heart-breaking stories), but it is an honest book about good people going to extraordinary lengths to do the best they can within a struggling health service.

It is a book about nursing written by Wilson, an ex-nurse, who is currently a novelist. One reviewer said that however good a writer she is, she was probably an even better nurse. This is because she has learnt The Language of Kindness to be used at times when it matters most to her patients and their families. It's about the smallest details in nursing and understanding how they can make the biggest difference. It's about the effects of working in the crumbling NHS on the physical and emotional health if its staff – it's hard to be kind when you're exhausted , undervalued, unsupported and depressed.


However, I found it to be an uplifting and heart-warming book, shot through with humanity, empathy, care and compassion. It is more than a memoir – it asks searching questions of the values in our society, and of the public health crisis governments have ignored for too long. It hopes for a kinder and more patient society especially for the most vulnerable.

And Wilson's advice for the future? 'Fall in love. In the end it's the only thing that matters. The most precious love of all is with your grandchild'.

A thought provoking, unforgettable book.

The Gate of the Year by Minnie Louise Haskins



These words were first brought to the public attention during the first royal Christmas broadcast, in 1939, when King George was offering a message of reassurance to his people. He said 'A new year is at hand. We cannot tell what it will bring. If it brings peace, how thankful we shall all be. If it brings us continued struggle, we shall remain undaunted.' He finished the broadcast with the words above which were the preamble from an obscure poem entitled *God Knows*, written in 1908 by an unknown poet, Minnie Louise Haskins.

Minnie Haskins was born and educated near Bristol where she studied informally at University College, Bristol while undertaking voluntary work for the local Congregational Church. By 1903 she was working in Lambeth for the Springfield Hall Wesleyan Methodist mission and in 1907 she departed for Madras with the Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society to work in the Zenana mission to women. In 1912, to raise funds, Minnie Haskins published a small volume of poetry *The Desert* which included the poem *God Knows*, originally written in 1908, to which she added the famous preamble. *Continued p14*

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The Gate of the Year continued

In 1915 poor health led Minnie Haskins to return to England where she ran a munitions workers' hostel in Woolwich for six months. This was followed by three years supervising the labour management department of a controlled factory in Silvertown, West Ham. Somehow she found time to publish a second volume of poetry *The Potter* in 1918.

Minne Haskins did not hear the King's Christmas message, and it was not until the following day that she read a summary of the speech. She thought the words sounded familiar and then it suddenly dawned on her that they were out of her little book. The poem had been drawn to the King's attention by his wife Elizabeth, the present Queen's mother, and its words remained a source of comfort to (the Queen Mother) for the rest of her life. She had its words engraved on stone plaques and fixed to the gates of the King George VI Memorial Chapel at Windsor Castle where the King was interred, and the word were included in a reflection in her funeral order of service.


