





### **Desert Island Discs**

Andrew McKenzie is our castaway this month, and here are his Desert Island Discs.

1812 Overture by Tchaikovsky. This old favourite was played by the Brighouse and Rastrick Brass Band some years ago at the Gilbert and Sullivan Christmas concert. It was an absolutely stunning performance and left an indelible impression on me.



Zadok the Priest by Handel. Another well-known but impressive musical work. Who can fail to appreciate the dramatic effect it had when it was performed at the recent coronation of the King.

Silver Threads Amongst The Gold. An amazing virtuoso solo by the cornetist at a special concert at the Royal Albert Hall entitled 'a Yorkshire Festival of Music' in aid of Yorkshire Cancer Research. Fifty six choirs and two brass bands gave the concert. I could listen to this CD time and time again.

The Onedin Line Theme as arranged by Mantovani. I enjoy middle of the road, easy listening orchestral music and Mantovani is one of my favourites of this genre. His arrangement of the theme for the TV series the Onedin Line is an impressive example of his work.

These Foolish Things played by Yehudi Menuhin and Stephane Grappelli. YM and SG, both masters in their respective spheres of music have a bit of fun taking this old standard and tastefully juggling it up with their respective improvisations.

Limehouse Blues played by the Dutch Swing College Band. A jazz standard but in this recording it is played as a piano solo albeit with some discreet backing from the rest of the band. A very polished performance results.

Stardust played by the Ted Heath Orchestra. Another well known standard but this time played as a duet by two of the band's trumpeters. A very clever arrangement with a fantastic climax.

Moonlight Serenade by the Glen Miller Orchestra. The Glen Miller music was amongst the best for ballroom dancing. Instantly recognisable from the first few bars Moonlight Serenade was a really popular favourite of its era.

### **GOOD KING WENCESLAS**

It's not what you thought! Judith has copied this story from https://www.whychristmas.com/customs/carols-stories

This carol was written in 1853 by John Mason Neale to a traditional folk tune (which had been used as a Spring carol for several hundred years!). It was written in the town of East Grinstead, in the county of West Sussex, at Sackville College where he was staying at the time. The story in the carol is about the King (or Duke) of Bohemia (an area in Central Europe which is now part of Czechia) from over 1000 years ago, seeing peasants, on Boxing Day, from his castle and taking food and wood to them. The story in the carol was probably completely made up to reflect the view that you should be charitable at Christmas. In fact the real story of King Wenceslas (907-935) is rather gory!

Wenceslas' father was the Duke of Bohemia and a Christian but it's thought that his mother might have been a pre-Christian/pagan. His father died when he was 12 and, as he was not old enough to become Duke until he was 18, his mother took control of the land as regent. During this time his grandmother, Ludmilla, took care of Wenceslas and brought him up as a Christian (she smuggled priests into the house to help teach him). It's thought that his mother had Ludmilla banished to a distant castle where she was murdered by the Queen's guards!

Good King Wenceslas continued.

Wenceslas was still a Christian after this and learned to read and write, something which was unusual for even a King/Duke in those days! He had local Bishops smuggled in at night to teach him the Bible. When he reached 18, Wenceslas took control of his dukedom. He then defended Bohemia from a couple of invasions by Dukes of neighbouring regions and legend says that he banished his mother and her pre-Christian/pagan followers from his castle.

Wenceslas put in a good education system and a successful law and order system, so the parts of the carol story about him being a kind King are certainly true!

After four years of happiness, when Wenceslas was 22, his brother Boleslav, became very jealous of Wenceslas and plotted (possibly with the pre-Christian/pagan followers of their mother) to kill Wenceslas. Boleslav invited Wenceslas to celebrate a saint's day with him, but on the way to the Church, Wenceslas was attacked and stabbed to death by three of Boleslav's followers!

The (fictitious) story told in the song was written by a Czech poet Václav Alois Svoboda in 1847. He wrote many 'manuscripts' that tried to prove that Czech literature was much older and more developed than it really was. The poem was written in three languages, Czech, German, Latin, and was called 'Sankt Wenceslaw und Podiwin' (Saint Wenceslas and the Crocheteer). The Poem found it's way into the UK in the 19th Century where JM Neale put the translated words to the tune of a 13th century spring carol 'Tempus Adest Floridum' ('It is time for flowering') that was came from a collection of old religious songs called 'Piae Cantiones' that was published in 1582 in Sweden/ Finland!



### AN AFTERNOON OF BLISS

On 28th October 2023 a significant event took place at Wesley Centre. It was the AGM of the Sir Arthur Bliss Society. Sir Arthur Bliss



(1891 to 1975) was a prolific composer, who was appointed Master of the Queen's Music in 1953. The Society aims to make his music better known. The chairman of the Arthur Bliss Society, David Salter, lives in Harrogate and is a regular attender at our concerts.

The first half of the event was a lecture recital by Professor Philip Wilby. The Arthur Bliss Society and Bliss Trust have commissioned Philip Wilby to orchestrate Bliss's Viola Sonata into a viola concerto and he talked about the process of orchestration.

The second half consisted of a performance by the Carlton Main Frickley Colliery Band conducted by David Purkiss. The CMFC is one of the world's leading brass bands. There were about 30 players present, and they performed works by Bliss, John Ireland and Philip Wilby. The piece by Philip Wilby, 'Astralis', received its premiere in Malmö, Sweden in 2022, but the performance at Wesley was its English premiere. I wonder how many premieres of English music have taken place at Wesley.

The Arthur Bliss Society has members throughout the world. They were able watch the concert live as a technical team was present.

The Bliss AGM does illustrate how versatile Wesley Centre is as a performance space.

We talked about how we might approach the future of local Methodist worship and ministry in Harrogate and Knaresborough.


The reading from Luke 5 1-11 (the story of the great catch of fish), was the theme throughout the day.

We concluded the day with communion. It had been an interesting and thought provoking day, with our friends from the circuit.

### Desiderata:

Judith read this piece at a recent Sunday Share. It turned out that quite a few of us present were very familiar with it, and Ulrike showed us her framed copy which is hanging in their home.

**Go placidly** amid the noise and the haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence. As far as possible, without surrender, be on good terms with all persons.

Speak your truth quietly and clearly; and listen to others, even to the dull and the ignorant; they too have their story.

Avoid loud and aggressive persons; they are vexatious to the spirit. If you compare yourself with others, you may become vain or bitter, for always there will be greater and lesser persons than yourself.

Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans. Keep interested in your own career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time.

Exercise caution in your business affairs, for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals, and everywhere life is full of heroism. Be yourself. Especially do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment, it is as perennial as the grass.

Take kindly the counsel of the years, gracefully surrendering the things of youth. Nurture strength of spirit to shield you in sudden misfortune. But do not distress yourself with dark imaginings. Many fears are born of fatigue and loneliness. Beyond a wholesome discipline, be gentle with yourself. You are a child of the universe no less than the trees and the stars; you have a right to be here.
