MINISTERS' BOARD

Many of you will have noticed we have updated the Board in the foyer in time for our 160th Anniversary celebrations.

The engraver who did the last updates from 1999 was not available. However, looking through archives we found the original order and invoice, dated 20th September 1995, for the actual supplying of the board when it was first put up. The cost was £293.75p and Geoff Roberts, Ted Dawson and Alan Stangroom were all part of the team that organised it.

The firm, based in Starbeck is still in business. The original owner, Mr David Walbank has retired but his two sons, are now in charge. Although Tim, one of the sons, stated they did not do gold leaf lettering anymore, he was interested in the history of the sign and would speak with his dad and see what could be done.

A few weeks later the new updated board was delivered back to Wesley Chapel and the engraver was the same gentleman who had done the first board back in 1995; contacted by the original owner, he had come out of retirement and has been proud and a little emotional by seeing his work of twenty seven years previously. What a lovely story. **Les.**

PASTORAL REPORT TO CHURCH COUNCIL OCTOBER 2022

During one of our recent pick-up grandchildren from school days, I read the Pastoral letter from Revd Claire Renshaw, the rector in the Walkingham Hill Benefice that includes the village church of All Saints in Staveley. I was touched by this letter and gained permission to share this with the members of Wesley Chapel (with just a few tweaks). Thank-you Claire.

We recently celebrated harvest in Wesley, when the fruits of all the hard labour of our farmers are ready to be shared and enjoyed. It takes a lot of hard work and effort to grow these crops, they need planting, nurturing, feeding and watering, pests need to be kept away and stopped from harming the crops.

The bible uses images of creation to draw out universal truths and often compares the human inner life to that of creation. We as people, are also described to be able to produce fruits for God in our lives, but that too takes a lot of hard work. We need to plant the seeds which is the word of God, we need to feed it regularly and let it take root in our hearts and through prayer and self-reflection we need to keep away anything that can harm its growth.

Crops need to stay rooted and drawing from their source if they are to continue to grow. We too need to stay rooted in God and drawing on Him for our strength and sustenance. It is described as "abiding in Him". The fruits we then see growing in our lives are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. (Galatians 5:22-23)

In September we saw the sad loss of our beloved Queen. If we could look anywhere for what a life well rooted in God looks like, she would be a wonderful example.

The type of character of Her Majesty does not happen by accident, by her own admission she grew from a life built on the foundations and teachings of Jesus. Jesus was her inspiration and guide throughout her whole life. It was in Jesus that she found the strength and direction, to do what she was called to do.

None of us are here by accident, God has a purpose for each of us, but whether we fulfil that purpose is down to us. Each of us as Christians longs to hear those words from Jesus when we get to the end of our lives, 'Well done, good and faithful servant!'





I have been—and remain—very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for his steadfast love. I have indeed seen his faithfulness?

DESERT ISLAND DISCS

This month Graham shares his desert island discs.

Bach: Passacaglia and Fugue in C Minor. No surprise here for Wesley members, given my long

organ playing history, but I find it stimulating and uplifting. I have half learnt this work, but have never performed it! It is one of Bach's finest works, in my opinion.

Schumann: Piano Quintet. I think I have known this piece for nearly forty years, I simply find it very beautiful, it is very tuneful and cheers me up, not a bad thing on a desert island! Wagner wrote of this piece, 'My dear Schumann, your quintet has given me great pleasure: I beg your dear wife to play it again.....it is the only salvation: beauty!'

John Rutter: Feel the Spirit, A cycle of seven spirituals. This work starts with *Joshua fit the battle of Jericho* and ends with *When the saints go marching in*. In between come *Steal away*, *I got a robe*, the plaintive *Sometimes I feel like a motherless child*, *Every time I feel the Spirit* and *Deep river*. If I ever feel in need of cheering up, this is the recording for me, I can't recommend it too much.

Faure: Cantique de Jean Racine. I have both sung and played the organ accompaniment to this work several times with Vocalis and I find it simply sublime. It is a religious piece, the words of which were written by the 17th century French writer, Jean Racine. The first verse translates as,

O divine word above, our hope and consolation, Eternal light of the heavens and the earth. Our voices greet the morning; Look down, O Lord and hear thy people's prayer.

Tchaikovsky: 1st Piano concerto. I struggled to choose between this and *The Rachmaninov Rhapsody on a theme of Paganini* that Mike chose last month, but this is a piano concerto and I love the piano! it is a very large-scale work, full of feeling and requires a very big technique from the pianist! I first heard this work in the Free Trade Hall in Manchester when I was on a school trip from Huddersfield. It left a deep impression on me then, as it was so exciting, and I have loved it ever since.

Graham's Desert Island Discs continued.

Debussy: Clair de Lune. A complete change of mood now to something very calm and soothing. This is a piano work that I have learnt, but never performed. It is an uncomplicated work, but tender and one which reaches emotional depth.

Handel: Hallelujah Chorus from Messiah. I have performed the organ accompaniment to the Messiah on numerous occasions, starting when I was a student in Manchester. At that time I lived in non-theological student accommodation in Hartley Victoria College where one of the theological students decided to start a choir. He had plenty of talent at his disposal, including students from the then Royal Manchester College of Music with additional singers from the university Methodist society. These performances were quite an occasion, indeed one now world-famous opera singer sang the bass solo for us several times while he was still a humble student. Longlasting friendships were made, indeed I married one of the singers in the chorus! We took the performances to towns near and far including Dragon Parade Methodist Church in Harrogate. Since those days I have performed the work in Shrewsbury, when the conductor was the minister there, at Wesley, under Margaret Righton, on several occasions and also in Knaresborough and Ripley. This piece holds so many memories for me as well as being a fine work and very uplifting.

Louis Armstrong: It's a wonderful world. A complete contrast, but a song I truly love. It is a wonderful world and I have been fortunate to visit many parts of it and see some wonderful sights, including the Rocky mountains, the Grand canyon, and several European countries. I have made many friends along the way and have enjoyed so many special times here in Harrogate which is a beautiful place to live.

Thank you for your lovely choices Graham. I shall be listening to them all during the next month. In our November Focus one of our young people, Tom, will be choosing his desert island discs.

Enthusiasm isn't always enough to prevent recordings of unfamiliar music from sounding raw but these performances feel fully matured - fresh, intelligent and strikingly stylish: edgy when they need to be and opening out generously when Parry's romantic impulse demands it.'

Monday, 7th November 2022 (1pm) Lunchtime Recital. Elisabeth Llewellyn (soprano) and Simon Lepper (piano).

Since making her operatic debut as Mimi in La Bohème at English National Opera, Elisabeth Llewellyn has established herself internationally as an artist of distinction. She has been praised for her "rich opulent voice" (The Times) as well as for "beautiful depth of expression and emotional intelligence" (Telegraph). In 2021/22 Elisabeth Llewellyn returned to the Metropolitan Opera, New York as Bess in Porgy and Bess. In July 2022, she took the soprano role in A Sea Symphony by Vaughan Williams at the BBC Proms. Elisabeth Llewellyn was awarded an MBE in The Queen's Birthday Honours 2022, marking her extraordinary contributions and services to classical music across the UK.

Meeting the King

The President of the Methodist Conference the Revd Graham Thompson represented the Methodist Church when Faith Leaders were invited to attend an audience with the King at Buckingham Palace three days before the Queen's State Funeral. Here we take a look behind the scenes from Revd Thompson's blog:

'There were some thirty people representing various Christian denominations and other faith groups.

The audience began with a short speech and continued with a conversation with each of us in turn. I took the opportunity to reiterate the condolences of the Methodist people at this time of personal loss and assured the King of our continuing prayers for him as our new Sovereign.

Why did the King invite Faith Leaders to the palace so quickly? There is a clue within the speech when he said, 'I also wanted, before all of you today, to confirm my determination to carry out my responsibilities as Sovereign of all communities around this country and the Commonwealth and in a way which reflects the world in which we now live'. He went on to say, 'I have always thought of Britain as a 'community of communities.' That has led me to understand that the Sovereign has an additional duty . . . to protect the diversity of our country, including (by) protecting the space for Faith itself and its practise through the religions, cultures, traditions and beliefs to which our hearts and minds direct us as individuals. This diversity is not just enshrined in the laws of our country, it is enjoined by my own faith'.

The audience was a way of letting faith leaders and those whom we serve - and the world - that the King places a high value on faith within the life of our nations. Also, that faith plays an important part in enabling Britain to be the 'community of communities' that he has pledged - and will pledge - his allegiance to.

As we reflect on the words of the King, we are each encouraged to ask what it is that we can do (or continue to do) - on our own and with others - to enable people to flourish within the communities we serve. 
