Desert Island Discs

Philip Goodwin is our castaway this month..

J S Bach Organ: Passacaglia and Fugue in C minor. I quote from the introduction in my old tattered music copy 'It is universally regarded as one of Bach's greatest works, eminently fitted to display the resources and grandeur of the organ.' Sadly I have to admit that it is not eminently fitted to the skills of this organist, I've returned to it several times over the last 40 years, and managed to murder it occasionally



on Wesley Chapel's organ when no-one is listening! It is a stupendous work. A Passacaglia quotes an 8-bar theme on the pedals. Bach then, over the next 16 pages (!) requotes it over 30 times with the most extraordinary variations, ending, of course, with a flourish with full organ. The man was an utter genius.

J S Bach Oratorio: B Minor Mass. Another masterpiece, though in a totally different vein of course. Though introduced as '. . this stupendous creation of his mighty genius . .' in our choral society copy, Bach wrote in 1733 to the Duke of Saxony 'I lay before your Kingly Majesty this trifling work . . ' Talk about self-effacing, or perhaps he was pandering to his future boss! Of all the several big oratorios by Bach this is for me the most grand, and Jenny and I have been privileged to sing it with Harrogate Choral Society. It is grand and stirring stuff. Please can I take it all to my desert island ? It only lasts about 2 hours.

J S Bach Orchestral: Brandenburgh Concerto No.4. This is the 4th concerto, and is for orchestra and two recorders (or two flutes). All six of the Brandenburgs are lively foot-tapping classical baroque style, and will never pall for me.

Schubert : Piano Quintet 'the Trout' Franz Schubert, famous for writing his 600 romantic songs, also wrote over 50 chamber music pieces, from trios, quartets, quintets and up to an octet. 'The Trout', for piano and 4 strings, is perhaps the most well-known, though any of his many quartets will do for me. Why chamber music? Well, I love to be sitting close and watching, seeing and feeling the wonderful sense of ensemble playing, that 'togetherness' where they are all listening and responding to each other, talking to each other musically. *Continued* Philip's Desert Island Discs continued.

Max Bruch: 'Kol Nidrei'. Here the 'cello soloist, for me, has to be André Navarra. I have a 60+ year old vinyl LP, being my introduction to Max Bruch. I feel the 'cello is the most soulful solo instrument, it can really speak or sing with feeling. 'Kol Nidre (Hebrew/Aramaic for 'All Vows') is a prayer sung in Jewish synagogues and starts with an expression of repentance for all unfulfilled vows and promises to God. The combination these sentiments, this soulful instrument, Bruch's rich music and the interpretation by André Navarra I find strongly emotional. You can actually hear this old Navarra recording on You tube (sound only) or view other cellists' performance.

Oscar Peterson: 'Lulu's Back in Town'. Now to move to a lighter vein. Peterson is just the outstanding jazz pianist for me, and this is such a happy, upbeat, honkytonk piece played with utterly remarkable technique. He is usually seen to be smiling while playing, and often muttering or singing to himself. Lovely to watch and to hear.

Joe Pass - Guitar: 'Ain't misbehavin'. I love hearing and watching a good guitarist. I see the guitar as its own complete solo instrument, but when you hear the American jazz artist Joe Pass you can hear the sounds and rhythms of a complete band. He performed a lot with Oscar Peterson, George Shearing and Ella Fitzgerald. On this delightful virtuoso recording he is introduced by Oscar Peterson.

Bix Beiderbecke: Riverboat Shuffle. Bix was a famous jazz trumpet player and bandleader in the creole jazz band world of the 1920s in New Orleans. This is highly nostalgic for me, taking me back to my boarding school days. My pal Richard and I shared a study, and besides forming a skiffle group, used to spend most of our pocket money in Sedbergh village ordering early jazz records at the little music shop. This track is on a 10" LP vinyl, which I still have.'

Just in case anything here appeals to you, then happy listening. And a Happy New Year !



BRIGHTEST AND BEST OF THE SONS OF THE MORNING

Brightest and best of the sons of the morning; Dawn on our darkness and lend us thine aid; Star of the East, the horizon adorning, Guide where our infant Redeemer is laid.

Cold on His cradle the dewdrops are shining; Low lies His head with the beasts of the stall; Angels adore Him in slumber reclining, Maker and Monarch and Savior of all!

Say, shall we yield Him, in costly devotion Odors of Edom and offerings divine? Gems of the mountain and pearls of the ocean, Myrrh from the forest, or gold from the mine?

Vainly we offer each ample oblation, Vainly with gifts would His favor secure; Richer by far is the heart's adoration, Dearer to God are the prayers of the poor.

The Singing the Faith Online website writes about the author of this hymn.

'At a time when hymn-singing at regular Sunday services was not officially sanctioned in the Church of England, Reginald Heber (1783 – 1826) conceived the idea of ordering (and singing) hymns around the church calendar. This innovative concept was, in a sense, the initial forerunner of Singing the Faith's own regular lectionary hymn suggestions. Heber himself wrote over 100 hymns while serving as vicar of Hodnet in Shropshire.

Born into a wealthy and educated family, Heber was bright, entering Oxford University aged 17 and winning poetry prizes, including the Newdigate Prize for his poem, "Palestine". Following graduation, he was elected a Fellow of All Soul's College and travelled in northern Europe before being ordained in 1807. He became vicar (and Lord of the Manor) in the village of Hodnet near Shrewsbury in the west of England. He remained there for 16 years, also active as an academic and editor, before taking up, following some initial hesitation, the bishopric in Calcutta (now Kolkata) in 1823. He was active across all of British India, and ordained the first Indian to take Anglican orders.

Brightest and Best of the Sons of the Morning continued.

Reginald Heber died in India, following three intense years of ministry and travel. He was seen at the time as a martyr to the cause of overseas Christian mission. (The monument pictured stands in St Paul's Cathedral, Kolkata.)

The Canterbury Dictionary of Hymnology comments that 'Heber's sudden and untimely death in India made him a missionary hero, and helped to ensure that his advocacy of hymn singing within the Church of England was successful. His position as a highly-regarded figure helped to dispel the idea that hymns were associated with Methodists and extreme Evangelicals.'

Other popular hymns by Heber include 'Holy, holy, holy, Lord God Almighty!' (StF 11), 'From Greenland's icy mountains' and 'By cool Siloam's shady rill', which has been taken up again in some more recent hymn books, including Church Hymnary 4.'

26th Jan 2024. Australia Day is the national day of Australia which marks the arrival of the First Fleet at Sydney Cove in 1788. A public holiday in Australia, it is celebrates the diversity of the Australian people with community and family events.

26th Jan to 28th Jan 2024. Garden Birdwatch. Organised by the RSPB. Across the UK, over half a million people took part in Big Garden Birdwatch 2023, counting a whopping 9.1 million birds! House Sparrows took the top spot, but counts of these chirpy birds are down by 57% compared to the first Birdwatch in 1979. In fact, we've lost 38 million birds from UK skies in the last 60 years. With birds facing so many challenges, it's more important than ever to get involved in the Birdwatch. Every bird you do – or don't – count will give RSPN a valuable insight into how garden birds are faring.

27th Jan 2024. International Holocaust Remembrance Day. The date marks the anniversary of the liberation of the Nazi Concentration and Extermination Camp of Auschwitz-Birkenau by Soviet troops on 27 January 1945.
