Virginia Plain – Roxy Music. I first heard Roxy Music on The Old Grey Whistle Test. They played this track. They were not a mainstream Top of the Pops band. THE WORK OF DEACON GARY

Deacon Gary Hoare has written a report to churches detailing highlights of some of the things he has been involved with since being in the Nidd Valley Circuit. Below is an extract from his report. Gary also asks for your urgent prayers:

- For the Christmas Charity stall in Harrogate on Friday 6 December from 2.30pm 7.30pm, for more helpers, good conversations and great weather. May the Lord bless everyone involved.
- Prayers for Trinity wanting to reach out carol singing on 12 December in the town pubs and eating places, and 19th around the St., Georges area HG2, for a response from people on the estate.
- For carol singing in the Shepherd's Dog pub on 23 December.
- Cards being delivered on the Watcombe Estate for Christmas.

Gary writes: '...Angie and I have been in the Nidd Valley Circuit for over 12 months now. We arrived from Weston super Mare in Somerset, having completed 8 years working in that circuit.....

The main area I have been looking at is, what we can do with new and developing housing estates. ...there are a lot of estates popping up around Harrogate and Knaresborough, and more are planned near in the Whinney Lane area and Kirk Hammerton. I have spent time wandering around seeing who is around on these estates, what the estates are made up of, trying to find out what people do with their time; where they take their children to school; what facilities the estates have for communities to meet together; trying to find out these things may help us deliver something.

I have a lot of meetings in cafes around the town, I don't really meet people in churches. This is mainly because I'm determined to take the church out of the building to where people are.

Jennyfields. A new pastor has come to the evangelical church. Jon is a curate who lives on Jennyfields. We meet together and pray, I support them as at the Community Sports Centre, where there is the Rachel Daley's Community Café. They make tea and coffee quite often for people passing by. The money helps to pay for the junior football team that plays on the field there at the weekends. They are doing this to help understand the community they are in and also to serve a need. They are also witnesses to God whilst they are there.'

A Statement in response to the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury from the Methodist Church in Britain

In light of the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury following the Makin Review into abuses by the late John Smyth QC, the Methodist Church in Britain joins others in praying for all those affected by abuse. Survivors have been courageous in speaking of their experience and in calling the Churches to account and we hope humbly to continue to learn from them.

We are covenant partners with the Church of England, an anniversary we marked last month. Dr Welby has done much to strengthen the partnership between our denominations and we pray for the continuation of this work and for those who will discern who should be the next Archbishop of Canterbury. We are committed to developing our shared understanding and desire for good safeguarding practice at every level of our churches.

Many church and national leaders endorsed the event including the Prime Minster, Downing Street and politicians. The weekend was highlighted by many media outlets including *Good Morning Britain* where hundreds of thousands heard that Shine Your Light was about proclaiming Christ at Christmas!

As a result of Shine Your Light last year, we heard stories of people coming to faith and churches welcoming in new people. It showed that when Christians come together for the Gospel, whole communities can be reached!

This Christmas, the vision is to mobilise over 100,000 Christians outdoors to reach 1 million people in the streets and public places with the Gospel. Last year, we heard of hundreds of flashmob style carol events, open air Christingle services and nativity events from the small to the large including some in Castles, country parks and housing estates.

This year, the vision is to see how the united Church can put CHRIST back into Christmas so that the whole nation can hear the bold proclamation of Good News and why we sing *"Joy To The World!"*

All our Shine Your Lights events are solely focused on enabling the true message of Christmas to be heard by those outside he Church. While it is acknowledged, Church attendance increases during the Christmas season, there will be many who will not darken the door of a church.

The church has a unique opportunity this year in towns, villages and cities to bring Light and Joy to many through our boldness and unity.

The Church of England and the Methodist Church in Britain recommit to working together as Covenant turns 21



Anglicans and Methodists in England underlined our commitment to for`ging closer ties as we marked the 21st anniversary of an historic covenant between our two churches.

The Anglican-Methodist Covenant was signed by leaders of the Church

of England and the Methodist Church in Great Britain in front of Queen Elizabeth II on 1 November, 2003, with services of celebration at both Methodist Central Hall and its immediate neighbour Westminster Abbey.

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York, Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell joined with the President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd. Helen Cameron and the Vice President of the Methodist Conference, Carolyn Godfrey, on Monday 4 November to reaffirm the two Churches commitment to the Covenant. The celebration took place at Methodist Central Hall Westminster followed by evensong at Westminster Abbey.
