Finance.

- The unaudited accounts were accepted for 2021-22. (see p10).
- There is money in a restricted fund which was raised specifically from donations to Christmas lunches, which are no longer a feature of the work of Wesley. This money should either be returned to the people who donated or given to another charity. It was agreed that a note be put out to inform people of this and unless there are any objections the money will be used for another outreach project, for example Warm Spaces in which Wesley is going to participate. (See p 9).

Stewards Report. The Senior Steward's report was published in last month's Focus.

Circuit Mission Hub. Circuit Mission Statement and Circuit Mission Policy. These documents have been produced by the Circuit Vision and Strategy Group and churches were asked to discuss at their church councils. (See Les or Judith for a copy). They were produced to aid churches in discussing their mission going forward. The Policy is designed to make us think about what we can do. It is better to do one or two things and to do them well.

Our mission at Wesley Chapel has started positively with Wesley Wheelie Welcome Café. A family member of Shelagh has produced excellent posters, and a new one will be available leading up to the Shoppers Carol Service on 13 December.

Warm Space in Winter. This is an initiative encouraging churches to offer a warm space during the winter months in the coming difficult financial period. The aim is to provide a warm, comfortable space, including offering tea and coffee, and perhaps magazines, newspapers as well as the facility to charge mobile phones. must be confidential Attendance and non-judgemental and safeguarding is important. The key is to keep things simple, and it is a good idea to back it on to something that we are already doing (ie Tuesday Coffee), as we will already have the heating on, and volunteers already there.

It was suggested that we could open for longer on Tuesdays, from 10.30 to 2pm and as well as serving tea, coffee, hot water to refill flasks, we could offer soup at lunch time, our baby-changing facilities may also be useful. A table would be provided so that people could light a candle. Everything provided would be free. It was also suggested that we could link up with other churches who may not be able to open but could provide help.

Harrogate Hub is co-ordinating the offers from churches in Harrogate, to ensure that venues will not all be open at the same time and on the same day.

More ideas would be welcome, Wesley members are encouraged to pray for this mission. *Continued*

Church Council notes continued

Together in Love. Circuits are encouraged to make decisions regarding same-sex marriages in our churches. Discussions should be held at church council meetings designed to discuss that one subject. It should be noted that Nidd Valley Circuit is not forcing any one church to decide. It is entirely up to individual ministers regarding their own part in this. Bilton and Trinity have both had their discussions and decided that it will be ok to have same-sex marriages in their churches. It was agreed that Wesley defer its decision for the time being. Everyone is encouraged to read the report that was produced by Connexion. (See Lesley, Les or Judith for a copy).

Christmas markets. There will be two festive markets in Harrogate leading up to Christmas and it is hoped that we will be able to open for a coffee morning on one of those Saturdays if we are able to find someone to organise.

Connecting with local businesses. Some conversations have taken place with two neighbouring shops. Geek Retreat is a computer games café and social hub, providing a welcoming and safe environment for everyone. Their owner a Baptist minister is interested in working with us. Ben Clowes is intending to meet up with him. The owners of the local antique shop have expressed an interest in holding an antique fair at Wesley and Its owners have been taking an interest in the folk who 'hang around' our building and have expressed an interest in working with Wesley. It is also known that Greggs also have charitable schemes that we could link in with.

2021/22 General Church Account Summary

<u>Notes</u>

Sunday collections were £1100 down on last year. Gift Aid income was also down but this was partly because the gift aid on cash donations of £490 wasn't received until after the year end. The most important feature of expenditure was that we resumed paying the Centre rent in 2021/22.

It was really encouraging to see income coming in from other Chapel activities as we emerged from covid. Nevertheless, we ended the year with a deficit of £5085 on General account. Our total reserves at the end of the year were £2457.

ANNIVERSARY WEEKEND 1-3 OCTOBER

Our 160th Anniversary weekend was a very busy, very enjoyable and uplifting occasion. So many people contributed on both the Saturday and Sunday to make everything work so well and thanks go to them all, too numerous to mention by name. However, one exception, we were thrilled and greatly appreciative of Rev. Leslie Newton, our District Chair, leading our Anniversary service; over fifty people in the congregation were both inspired and challenged (in a very positive and thoughtful way) and as one of our members commented after our excellent Anniversary lunch, 'that has been one of the most uplifting and enjoyable days I have had for a very long time'.

This splendid display was much too good to only be displayed for one weekend.

'During this month of October, on Saturday the 18th, the first marriage in the new Chapel was celebrated between Abraham Walter Thomas, 27, Bachelor, Farmer, and Elizabeth Mary Jeffray, 21, Spinster.'



The descendants of the first couple to be married at Wesley kindly lent us the photographs and family Bible seen in the top photographs.

The actual anniversary date, 3 October, coincided with the opening of the new concert season. We were delighted to welcome Leonora Piano Trio, who thrilled the appreciative audience with a concert, which Les said was 'simply the best music recital I have ever listened to.'



Wesley has a long history of splendid music. In their history of Wesley Chapel 1862-1962 the authors recall the tenure of Mr Fred Wood, the renowned choirmaster, who 'after he had brought the choir to the point at which they were achieving two new anthems every Sunday, (Mr Wood wrote) "we then began to think of Oratorio performances. We could not afford the time out of our weekly practices, but the Choir were sufficiently keen to take on an extra night's work each week. Our first effort was Dvorak's At the foot of the Cross, and I remember with gratitude the Rev Walter J Morgan saying in the vestry afterwards that he had been deeply moved by the beauty of the singing, and by the fine playing of Miss Wood at the organ. In succeeding years we sang, besides Stainer's Crucifixion which was our annual event each Passiontide, various Oratorios (one each year) including Brahm's Requiem, Handel's Messiah. Mendelssohn's Hymn of Praise, and St Paul (which we repeated in St Peter's Church (the choir)... won (many honours with Mr Wood). They took First Place with an Honours Certificate at the Harrogate Musical Festival in 1937. and, after splitting the choir into two halves for the 1938 Festival. Mr Wood had the pleasure of seeing his two choirs take First and Second Place. Wesley Chapel 1862-1962 by H S Hitchen and T E Dawson.

At the end of August 2022 we Berlin. Two of visited our children. Christoph (with his family) and Esther, live there. We exploring Berlin Mitte, i.e.Unter den Linden leading to the Brandenburg Gate and beyond to the Reichstag (the German





Parliament), the Staatsoper and the Gendarmenmarkt - a square with several buildinas. includina splendid the Konzerthaus, While in Berlin, I attended a recital at the Konzerthaus by a trio which included the violinist, Irène Duval, who performed at a lunchtime concert at Wesley in February 2022. Mitte is in the former East Berlin. The transformation of Berlin Mitte since the fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 has been truly remarkable. Much of it has been returned to its former glory.

One of the

things we enjoy is having breakfast in the restaurant on top of the Reichstag. To reach it, you have to walk by the glass dome designed by Sir Norman Foster. Its shape symbolises the reunification of Germany. From the restaurant, you have a magnificent view of the Berlin skyline. On the day we went, we were fortunate to have very good weather, so we could sit on the terrace.

CIRCUIT MEETING SEPTEMBER 2022

The Circuit Meeting at Starbeck was upbeat and positive and the Nidd Valley Circuit is an exciting place to be in spite of these difficult days of financial crisis and uncertainty. Here are some items from the meeting that may be of interest.

APPOINTMENTS

- Judith Yeats was appointed as Secretary to the Circuit Meeting.
- Graham Taylor (Gracious Street) is shadowing the Circuit Stewards for a year with a view to becoming a Circuit Steward in the future.
- Ron Hicks has agreed to act as Circuit Safeguarding Officer for the next year.
- Les Sudron will sit on the District Policy Committee as NVD Representative.

CANDIDATE FOR THE MINISTRY. Anna Cooley was due to give a presentation regarding her candidature for the ministry which was to be followed by a vote by members of the meeting. Unfortunately Anna was unwell and had sent her apologies. However this was rescheduled and actually took place at the Circuit 10 year Celebration Service on 23 October where the vote for Anna to candidate as a presbyter was an overwhelming yes.

GORDON HAY REINVITATION. Following a unanimous decision by the Circuit Invitation Committee and members of this meeting, Gordon has been reinvited to be a presbyter in this circuit for five more years. Congratulations to Gordon.

STAFFING

- **Circuit Administrator.** The advertisement for the Circuit Administrator has gone out with the hope of an appointment being made after 30 September.
- Wesley Centre Manager. An advert has been prepared for a Manager/Administrator at Wesley Centre.
- **Local Pastor** for Gracious Street, to work on the margins, is being refined at the present time.
- **Deacon.** It was agreed that we seek an experienced Deacon to join the Circuit in September 2023. This is an exciting opportunity for a deacon, with experience of preaching, to become involved with new communities around the Circuit and discover where God is at work. *Continued.*



2023 Planning. A solution for 2023 is being worked on by CLT. Meantime to cover for Grace's churches, each minister has taken responsibility for an additional church and a supernumary has been allocated to each church to assist.

Scotton: Lesley Taylor and Peter Whittaker. Park Grove: Moses John and Diane Hicks. Kirk Hammerton: Gordon Hay and Linda Phillips. Kearby: Gordon Hay and Gillian Robertson. Killinghall: Ben Clowes and Ron Hicks.

VISION AND STRATEGY: The focus is Mission, Discipleship and Worship with a view to maintaining quality Worship for all, encourage churches to reach outside their walls in Mission and to develop Discipleship growth through the revised Mission Policy and Hub with the idea of identifying 'Grace Spaces' outside our usual spaces for worship – it was suggested that all chapels should be able to achieve at least two out of three criteria in each area of the hub.

In order to do things 'further out from the centre' we need to free people to engage with this one suggestion being that if we had 2 churches on 5 or more sites, this would dramatically reduce Governance to free people for outreach purposes. This is to be an item for discussion at all church councils.

FINANCE. We are working with the HHP on applying for funding to refurbish Wesley House to provide Admin. Space for HHP.

PROPERTY. Killinghall refurbishment plans include electrical points in car park and renovations to the kitchen, which it is hoped will to draw people into the space. The building will be vacated from mid-October to January 2023.

BEN SABBATICAL. Ben will be taking a 3-month sabbatical in June, July, August 2024. A sabbatical support group will be organised.

2022-23 CONCERT SEASON

Regrettably, Simon Lepper has had to withdraw from the recital on Monday, 7th November. There is a rail strike scheduled for that day and Simon feels it is too risky to rely on the London to Harrogate train running on Monday morning. This means that the song recital with Elizabeth Llewellyn will be postponed. A decision had to be made sooner rather than later in order to find someone to step in.

I am pleased to announce, however, that the pianist **Steven Osborne** will give the recital on 7th November. His programme will include the Piano Sonata No. 1 by Rachmaninov. Whereas his Piano Sonata No. 2 is frequently performed, the Sonata No. 1 is rarely performed. Steven Osborne recently recorded the work to great critical acclaim. I am awaiting confirmation of the rest of the programme.

A THANK YOU FROM BEN





All that is gold does not glitter by J R R Tolkien

All that is gold does not glitter, Not all those who wander are lost; The old that is strong does not wither, Deep roots are not reached by the frost. From the ashes a fire shall be woken, A light from the shadows shall spring; Renewed shall be <u>blade that was broken</u>, The crownless again shall be <u>king</u>.

Sing a song of seasons! Something bright in all! Flowers in the summer, Fires in the fall!

O GOD OUR HELP IN AGES PAST

A hymn that is often used at Remembrance Services, but also a favourite of mine. I had it at my late husband's funeral, and I found it a great comfort. It was written in 1708 by Isaac Watts and paraphrases the Psalm 90. 'Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations.² Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God. It originally had nine verses, however nowadays the 4th, 6th and 8th verses are omitted in most hymn books, except the Methodist hymn books which includes the verse, 'The busy tribes of flesh and blood, with all their cares and fears, are carried downward by the flood, and lost in following years'. In 1738, John Wesley, in his hymnal Psalms and Hymns, changed the first line of the text from 'Our God', to 'O God'. Both Watt's original text and Wesley's rewording remain in current use.

The hymn was originally part of *The Psalms of David Imitated in the Language of the New Testament*, published by Watts in 1719. In this book he paraphrased in Christian <u>verse</u> the entire <u>psalter</u> with the exception of twelve Psalms which he felt were unsuited for Christian usage.

It is sung to the tune 'St.Anne which was composed by William Croft in 1708 whilst he was the organist of St. Anne's Church, Soho.

Later composers subsequently incorporated the tune in their own works. Handel used the tune in an anthem entitled *O Praise the Lord.* J S Bach's *Fugue in E-flat major* BWV552, is often called the St Anne, because of the similarity of its subject to the first line of the hymn tune, though there is some debate as to whether Bach used the actual tune after hearing it, or coincidentally created himself the very similar tune used as the fugal theme. Young Bach's inspirator and mentor Dieterich Buxtehude, church administrator and organist of St Mary's in Lübeck in north Germany, used the same first line of the hymn tune as theme for the (first) fugue of his Praeludiumpedaliter in E major for organ.

Arthur Sullivan used the tune in the first and last sections of his *Festival Te Deum*, first in a relatively standard setting, but eventually pairing it with a military march accompaniment.

The American composer Carl Ruggles (1876-1971) used the text in his last composition, Exaltation (for Brass, Chorus and Organ) in 1958 in memory of his wife Charlotte who had died the previous year. The hymn and words are also featured in Vaughan Williams's anthem "Lord, thou hast been our refuge", using both the *Book of Common Prayer*'s words and those of Watts.

According to a passenger on the Titanic, it was the last hymn sung at a church service presided over by Captain Smith on the morning before RMS Titanic sank.
